Thanks to Paul for introducing and demonstrating our last competition topic of the year – the pencil firing machine! Any mechanism powered by springs or elastic, maybe even compressed air is acceptable. As usual, your competition piece will be judged on its turning / aesthetics but must be capable of firing a standard pencil. Greta is organising scrutineering as we speak.

After the judging has been completed, a separate, informal firing range competition will be organised for the 'Jason Breach trophy' - to fire a standard rubber ended pencil from a table towards a horizontal target which we envisage being about 5m away. Full rules will be explained on the night.

Paul's demo produced a cannon style mechanism powered by a spring - whatever the choice of power for your piece the principles of carefully designing, accurately sizing parts and shaping the exterior of the piece will apply to produce your kit of parts, before assembly and trials to make sure it works! Good luck – if you would like some guidance, Rick has produced an excellent summary of the demonstration on the website – please take a look.






Interested in a new chuck? Vic found these latest offerings from Record Power which may be of interest. Make sure it comes in the correct spindle size to avoid using an adaptor.
